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Themes for the 2025-26 Governor's Budget



- Governor Gavin Newsom released his 2025-26 proposal amidst one of California's most devastating natural disasters
 - Employs the tenets of stability and resilience to protect California residents and the state's economy
 - Budget resilience is confronted by calls to expand essential services in an increasingly unaffordable state
- Following last year's proposed Proposition 98 "maneuver" to reduce education funding in the long term, his current proposal appears to under-appropriate the 2024-25 minimum guarantee by \$1.6 billion
- Amildst stable Proposition 98 funding, the Governor proposes an education budget that invests in core instruction and learning
- The protection of every Proposition 98 dollar is critical to ensure local leaders can provide high-quality education and services to their students


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The Governor's Budget and the Economy

- The California economy is continuing to grow with mixed signals for the road ahead
 - Inflation is persistent and the slowing of interest rate reductions by the Federal Reserve is impacting the state's housing market
 - With increased economic uncertainty, there are notable risks to Governor Newsom's 2025-26 State Budget and economic forecast
- The Governor's Budget projects a \$17 billion surplus and healthy reserves
 - The Governor presents a balanced budget that assumes steady, stable national growth
 - One of the greatest risks to the California economy and the Governor's budget assumptions is the state's vulnerability to the impacts of tariffs and changes in immigration policy


U.S. Gross Domestic Product




Proposition 98 and the Education Budget

- . K-14 education funding continues to encumber a significant share of California's annual Budget
- Within the state's spending limit, Proposition 98 funding, including local property taxes, has averaged 55% of state General Fund revenues since 2015-2025-26 is no different



Proposition 98 Tests

- . The 2024-25 Enacted Budget provided a lesson to us all about how the Proposition 98 minimum guarantee is calculated each year
- . Three "tests" embedded in the California Constitution determine the minimum guarantee



o plus 8.5%

2023-24 Proposition 98 Minimum Guarantee and the Maintenance Factor

- . As a result of the Legislature's action and the Governor's approval to suspend Proposition 98 in 2023-24, there is no adjustment to the prior-year minimum guarantee
- However, when the state suspends Proposition 98, it is obligated to restore education funding equal to the difference between Test 2 and the suspension level

Proposition 98 Suspension and Maintenance Factor

 In 2023-24, the difference between Test 2 funding and the suspension level modestly narrowed at Governor's Budget Reduces the estimated

Maintenance Factor obligation

From \$8.3 billion to \$8.0 billion



- Due to unanticipated growth in General Fund revenues, the state's Maintenance Factor payment increased in 2024-25
 - From \$4.1 billion at the 2024-25 Enacted Budget to \$5.6 billion at Governor's

2024-25 Proposition 98 Minimum Guarantee



Due to unanticipated General Fund revenues, the 2024-25 minimum guarantee is revised upward by \$3.9 billion

*[T]he Budget proposes to appropriate the Guarantee at \$117.6 billion, instead of at the currently calculated level of \$119.2 billion..."

2025-26 Proposition 98 Minimum Guarantee







CalPERS and CalSTRS Employer Contribution Rates

- The California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) employer contribution rate has leveled off
- According to CalSTRS, an annual employer contribution rate of 19.1% would eliminate the employer's unfunded liability three years ahead of schedule based on the CalSTRS full funding plan
- On the other hand, CalPERS rates are projected to continue their upward climb before falling in 2028-29 and 2029-30, according to revised projections released in fall 2024



Local Budgeting Considerations Heading Into May

LEAs should begin site and department budget meetings to develop allocation and spending plans for the 2025-26 fiscal year with the expectation that state categorical programs will not see any significant increases

LEAs should review staffing levels, especially services that are funded with one-time or temporary funding sources, as those positions should be assessed prior to the March cutoff for layoffs

> LEAs should refine enrollment projections for 2025-26 based on certified Census Day counts taken in October 2024, plus any growth or decline based on demographic information from internal analysis

> > LEAs should adjust COLA estimates downward for 2025-26 based on the Governor's January projection to 2.43%

Expanded Learning Opportunities Program—Current Law



New Declaration Requirement

- Starting in 2025-26, districts and charter schools must annually declare their intent to run the program Available funds will be used to augment the per-pupil

- . Starting with 2023-24 funds, a two-year deadline for expenditure

Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant

The Governor's Budget restores \$378.6 million to the LREBG, which supports learning recovery initiatives through the 2027-28 school year

- . The LREBG, initially funded at \$7.9 billion, was cut by in the 2023 Budget Act leaving \$6.8 billion
- · Recall, the LREBG regulrements were changed in the 2024 Budget Act—beginning in the 2025-26 school year, to utilize these funds, LEAs must conduct a new student needs assessment and include expenditures and actions in the LCAP



Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant—Current Law

Needs Assessment

LEAs must conduct a needs assessment for the use and expenditure of funds in 2025-28 through 2027-28

- Identify students in the greatest need of learning recovery supports based on chronic absentiesism and English language arts (ELA) and mathematics assessments.
- Include the interventions that will address the needs of the identified students

Minimum Amount

Cayle J. et al v. State of California settlement calls for at least \$2 billion to be captured through the needs assessments



CAP

Expenditures must be included in the 2025-26 through 2027-28 LCAPs

- Include at least one metric to monitor the impact of each action or service utilizing LREBG
- Provide evidence-based rationale for implementing these actions or services

Allowable Uses

- In addition to the original LREBG allowable uses, funds may also be used for training on mathematics or ELA frameworks
- Use of funds must be evidence-based

Literacy Investments—Proposition 98 One-Time Funding

Literacy Screening

- \$40 million one-time
- Supports purchase of screening materials and training for educators who administer screenings

TK-12 Literacy and Mathematics Coaches

- \$500 million one-time
- Expands Literacy Coaches Program and include mathematics coaches
- Prioritizes high-poverty schools

Literacy Network

- \$5 million annually through 2029-30
- Create a statewide network to provide resources to LEAs, highlight high-performing districts and best practices and provide support

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Home-to-School Transportation

The Governor's Budget applies the 2.43% estimated COLA to the LCFF Home-to-School Transportation add-on

An annual update to the Transportation Service Plan is required in order to receive reimbursement

- The annual update is required by April 1; the plan should include any updates primarily about the following fiscal/school year
- The adoption of the annual update by the governing board is a local decision, presenting the update as an information item is a consideration
- Consultation with educational partners is not required for the annual update

Universal School Meals Program

- In addition to applying the estimated statutory COLA for child nutrition programs, the Governor also proposes an increase of \$106.3 million ongoing to fully fund the universal school meals program for 2025-26
- The state projects that nearly one billion meats will be served through the universal meats program in the 2025-26 school year
- The Governor also proposes \$150 million in one-time funding for specialized kitchen equipment, infrastructure, and training to support schools in providing more freshly prepared meals made with locally grown ingredients



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Mandate Block Grant

Menstrual Products Mandeta AB 367 (Gercia, Statutes of 2021)

- AB 367 requires that public schools serving students in grades 6-12 stock school restrooms—all women's, gender-neutral, and all least one men's restroom—with an adequate supply of mensional products free of cost
- On March 22, 2024, the Commission on State Mandates (CSM) approved the test claim filed by the Education Mandated Cost Network (EMCN) in partnership with Hesperia Unified School District (USD)

FAFSA and CADAA Mandate AB 132 (Committee on Budget, Statutes of 2021)

- A8 132 requires that LEAs confirm their high school seniors complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or a California Dream Act Application (CADAA) (or opt out of the requirement)
- On May 24, 2024, the CSM partially approved the test claim filed by EMCN in partnership with Fresno USD
- In order for the DOF and the Legislature to determine an accurate statewide cost, claims submitted within the first 120 days are utilized
 - Due February 27, 2025
- This forms the basis for the State Budget appropriation
 - The cost estimate is used by the DOF as the basis for determining the increase to the Mandate Block Grant

- We do not yet have allocation or program details for many proposals in the Governor's Budget
 - Until more detail becomes available, do not include in 2025-26 budget development

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Special Education Multiyear Program Analysis and Projection

- LEAs should engage in multiyear program analysis to identify trends and patterns that may influence their service delivery, professional development, or capacity needs
- Multiyear program analysis encourages alignment of LEA plans and initiatives, incorporates compliance and improvement monitoring for students with disabilities (SWD), and ensures a continuum of support for all learners
- The degree to which an LEA implements a Multi-Tiered System of Support with quality early intervention and prevention strategies plays a key role in the cost of serving students



Special Education Multiyear Program Analysis and Projection

- Enrollment and demographics trends, data from the Dashboard, and performance indicator data sets can inform local planning and budgets
- Special Education Local Plan Areas have access to local and regional data specific to SWD, incidence of disabilities, service delivery trends, and more
- The Special Education Fiscal Collaborative provides support and resources to complete regional and statewide data comparisons



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

The Road Ahead

The next steps in the State Budget process are controlled by the Legislature, which has the responsibility to examine the Governor's proposals during budget hearings
